As students, many of us are subjected to unit tests, quizzes, and assignments on a weekly basis. Sometimes, a teacher will decide to have a midterm. But the final level, the grand finale of all assessments, the ultimate tests, are the finals, Regents, and AP Exams in May and June.

Before getting there, we dutifully troop through the unit tests and quizzes, the Google Forms, and graded homework assignments. In preparation, many find themselves scrambling for study guides, YouTube videos on particular subjects, or a teacher's extra help schedule. Some begin their meticulous planning the moment an assessment is announced and proceed with calm. Each person has his or her own unique way of preparing for an assessment, yet there are four general categories: the Last Minute Crammer, the Meticulous Planner, the Wild Card, and the Combination.

First up, the Last Minute Crammers. They are caught in a state between hopelessness and that irrepressible thought that maybe, just maybe, if they went over the slides just one more time, everything on the test would be imprinted into their brain. Last Minute Crammers, or LMCs, invariably have a faint aura of chaos around them, hurrying to do the hundred and one tasks that had been left until the last minute. Their Google Classroom "To-Do" has multiple missing assignments and a seemingly endless list in their "This Week".

On the day of the assessment, the only thing to be done is cram. A textbook will appear in their hands, following them everywhere, even to lunch, P.E., or any other class. The one tab on their computer is the presentation or the study guide posted by their teacher. A true LMC waits until lunch, a free period or even the 5 minutes during the transition period to fully concentrate on studying. The results...remain to be seen. No one knows what goes on inside the mind of an LMC as they are cramming, just as no one truly knows precisely how adrenaline impacts studying.

On the other hand, we have the polar opposite of LMCs: Meticulous Planners. Those who can identify as a Meticulous Planner (aka MP) are not common. They have a willpower that far exceeds normal students and begin studying the day a test is announced. Planning, to them, is merely part of the test. They formulate a detailed schedule, down to the hour, minute, and second.

Out of those already covered, we have seen both extremes: those who (over)prepare and those who don't. In the middle, a group of students classified as Combinations exists. Multiple variations of Combinations exist, with some ranging towards the MPs and some towards the LMCs; but their defining characteristic is their consistency. They stay on the same part of the spectrum throughout most of their high school career, the only opportunities for change being during the transitions between grade levels. After the lulling comfort of summer, Combinations stand the best chance of mutating into one of the other three types.

In the realm where education meets entrepreneurship, EHS's DECA team emerges as a champion, embodying the spirit of aspiring business leaders. The team was built in 2020 with only about 10 members, and is now taking 35 students to the State Career Development Conference. DECA is back in business with a mission that has propelled them to the next level of the competition.

Some of you may be wondering what DECA is exactly. For starters, DECA stands for Distributive Education Clubs of America, but the spelled-out acronym does not fully clarify what the organization does. The team's advisor and coach, Ms. Merlini, describes DECA as a "business competition," where students in grades 9 through 12 interested in the business arena can share their knowledge, as well as "compete with what they know and what they learn in their various classes."

Students, or future business leaders, from all across the world challenge themselves in DECA competitions, where they apply the tools and knowledge they gained from their business curriculums. Schools within our states, such as Ossining, Ardsley, and several in Long Island boast core business curriculums that help students better prepare themselves for these competitions. Edgemont does not have any business classes, let alone a curriculum. Ms. Merlini values the team's dedication and hard work and added that for the team to "achieve what they have achieved was pretty amazing." Other DECA club members and leaders agree with Ms. Merlini and add that it is rewarding to look back on how far the club has come. One of three vice presidents of the Edgemont DECA Chapter, Mathew Zeitz, values that DECA provides Edgemont "with a pathway for students to foster their love for business to take to college with them." Zeitz also carries the title of Regional President, which involves organizing the regional competition where 400-500 students from surrounding counties participate.

Edgemont's DECA team has a variety of different students, including the youngest member of the team, Ryan Waxler. He officially joined the team in eighth grade, but this was slightly unusual considering DECA is a high school competition. Waxler notes, "Since I was the only eighth grader to show up, Ms. Merlini pulled some strings, and she got me in, and that was really cool." One of the reasons Waxler joined the club and enjoys it so much now is because "DECA is a very professional environment and a cool experience as a whole," which made him feel very comfortable among his older peers. Comparing DECA to other clubs at Edgemont, Waxler describes it as "much different from Model UN and a less stressful environment," adding that it fosters a great community.

Aside from DECA being all about business, what sets it apart from any other club here at EHS? Ms. Merlini highlights that meetings are crucial, which may differ from other clubs. Since DECA members are already at a disadvantage without business classes, the meetings allow everyone to get caught up "with the language and the terminology and then how to do a role play and how to perform well in front of a judge." Ms. Merlini adds that those in the club are in it because they have "a passion for business." She shares this passion and studied Business and Marketing at Pace University.

Both Waxler and Zeitz mention that during club meetings they go over case studies and sample problems, where leaders of the team provide advice and direction to the club. It is clear that collaboration is something this team values during their meetings. Examples of business topics Zeitz highlighted were hotel management, apparel, food, sports, entertainment, small businesses, and business administration.

Now that we have an idea of what DECA is, there is something more recent that we should focus on: the ambition of many DECA members has allowed them to qualify for the DECA State Career Development Conference held in Rochester, New York, from March 6-8. The EHS DECA team placed second overall in the regional competition held in Rockland, punching their ticket to States. Members of the team describe the competitions as a social environment where students can engage in workshops and events together. Four Edgemont students competed last year in Orlando in the event following States, called the International Career Development Conference (ICDC). To be eligible to compete at ICDC, members must place in the top four in their competitive event at the state competition.

EHS's DECA team has transformed from a small group in 2020 to a thriving force of 35 students heading to the state conference. Their mission goes beyond competition and emphasizes knowledge-sharing among students interested in commercial enterprise. Given the serious focus on skill development, the team's collaborative and professional environment stands out. As they prepare for the DECA State Conference in March, their recent second-place finish at Regionals sets the stage for what is yet to come. EHS DECA is rocking the business scene and is certainly back in business!

Max has a lot of faith in his team, telling *Campus*, "The team is made up of a lot of young guys. There's a lot of raw talent that needs to be developed. We're going through the process every game and getting better every day. I'm excited to see how we grow throughout the season."

Edgemont started their season with a tough opener against Nanuet and lost. Two more tough defeats followed, the first coming against Irvington and the second against Blindbrook in the Louie Larizza Jr. Memorial tournament. Blindbrook's talented roster defeated Edgemont by 30 points. Sitting with a 0-3 record, the need for change was felt by all.

Max told us what he told the team after that game: "Today was the last time that we go onto that court and not give 100 percent. We will not win a single game this season if we do not give it our all, so from here on out, if you get in the game and you do not give your absolute best effort, then we have a huge problem." This speech seemed to work well, as Edgemont would win their next two games by a combined total of just under 50 points.

Standing at 2-3, the team was prepared to play in the Robert E. Mayclim tournament against Westlake, who have had their number in the past. In an extremely tense fourth quarter, a buzzer-beating shot from half-court propelled them to their best victory all year. The high didn't last long, as they suffered an embarrassing defeat to Croton later that weekend in the finals of the tournament. Since then, they have lost their two most recent games to Ardsley and Pelham.

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THE TRILLION DOLLAR RED SEA CRISIS

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Thousands of miles away from the war between Israel and Hamas lies the Red Sea, which has recently seen boats traveling in international waters being targeted by drones, rockets, and helicopters. Pirates have also intercepted a vessel. But how did it get like this?

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The Yemeni Houthis are a rebel group founded in 1992 but have been steadily gaining a following (and power) since the early 2000s. Their takeover of the capital of Yemen in September of 2014 sparked the Yemeni Civil War, which remains active to this day, though in recent years there has not been as much fighting. Even worse, the war has sparked a humanitarian crisis that has left ~80% of the country struggling to put food on the table.

Although the Houthis now control a sizable portion of Yemen, it is important to note that they are not internationally recognized as the official government of Yemen. The group is often compared to the Lebanese terrorist group Hezbollah, as both are all but confirmed to be funded by Iran and have received money and weapons from Tehran. Hamas also falls in this group of governing bodies.

Now turning the Houthi's Red Sea upheaval – on October 19th, they launched a series of indiscriminate missile and drone barrages on Israel. Though few did real damage, it showed that they were willing to get involved, which could escalate the war. Over the next couple of months, the group started attacking and hijacking many commercial ships (in international waters). The first belonged to Israeli companies, but as time went on, the targets seemed to have no relation to Israel at all – with many being from western companies.

To deter these Houthi attacks, the U.S. sent military ships to patrol and protect ships in the region, but they were met with drone and anti-ship missile attacks. The attacks were first denied by the Houthis, but they then confirmed that they had targeted the American vessels traveling in international waters. As of the writing of this article (January 15), the Houthis have launched attacks against 27 of civilian cargo ships, with many being fended off. However, some attacks have slipped through Western defenses and caused significant damage.

Given the safety risk, can't the boats just go around?

Well, no, and this is because over 100 years ago, on November 17, 1869, the Suez Canal opened, forever changing global shipping. It linked the Red Sea and Indian Ocean to the Mediterranean – meaning boats no longer had to travel around the Cape of Good Hope in South Africa – cutting shipping times dramatically.

Today, over \$1 trillion dollars in goods passes through the Suez Canal a year. Massive quantities of oil, mostly coming from Saudi Arabia, also travel through the Red Sea, which is connected to the Suez Canal. The African country Djibouti is situated right next to Yemen, only disconnected by a small strait, right next to the entrance to the Red Sea, and thus, the Suez Canal; its strategic location has helped it gain recognition from many countries and is the reason an otherwise overlooked country holds 8 military bases for the likes of the U.S., China, and the UK.

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Those military facilities give security so that in the case of a global conflict, those countries can ensure that the strait remains open. It is clear that Yemen occupies an important location, and the Houthis are using it to disrupt global trade, so what should the rest of the world do about it?

On January 3rd, 2024, the U.S. and many other countries sent a message to the rebels – telling them that what they are doing is illegal and to stop immediately. The Houthis have disregarded the message, refusing to slow down, so the U.S. has decided to take matters into its own hands; along with the United Kingdom, they have conducted various strikes on Houthi military installations. So far, there have been no reported civilian casualties as a result of these strikes.

Countries throughout the world are increasingly willing to intervene in some manner for the sake of global trade and economic stability. As for us students, we can only hope that this conflict will not escalate into a regional war.

WILL TRUMP BE OFF THE BALLOT?

As the 2024 primary elections are underway, Mr. Trump has been banned from not one, but two states. Here is a quick rundown of the events:

Among the Republican presidential candidates, former president Donald Trump is far ahead in the Republican Party's Primary polls, boasting a strong lead of 63.1%, compared to second place runner, former South Carolina governor Nikki Haley's 11.9%, and current Florida governor Ron Desantis' 11.6%.

Mr. Trump also dominated the recent Iowa caucuses, the first primary election, winning 51% of the votes and 98 of 99 counties; however, the two remaining candidates, Mr. Desantis and Ms. Hailey are still in contention*, as they won 21.2% and 19.1% of the votes, respectively. The Iowa caucus will likely be a sign of how the rest of the Republican primaries may go.

Mr. Trump's supporters believe that if he was reinstated as president, he would have the power necessary to carry out his agenda, like dealing with the southern border and working to improve the economy. His supporters also appreciate his more outspoken style and tend to come from rural backgrounds. About 60.8% of rural Republicans support Mr. Trump. He also seems to be looked upon favorably by young Republicans, with about 53% of Republicans aging 25-44 giving him their support. Still, Mr. Trump's third campaign for the White House might not be as smooth as the numbers suggest. Colorado's state Supreme Court recently ruled (in a 4-3 decision) that the former president cannot be in the White House, subsequently removing him from their primary ballot.

The decision cited Section 3 of the 14th Amendment, which states that anyone who has incited a rebellion against the United States is disqualified from any government office. This clause may apply to Mr. Trump due to his role in the riot at the Capitol on January 6th, 2021. Mr. Trump gave a speech on that day, urging his followers to "fight" and "march over to the Capitol." This is considered by some to be the root cause of the chaos that later ensued. The Colorado ruling is historic because it is the first use of the "insurrection" clause to prohibit a presidential candidate from appearing on a primary ballot.

Shortly after Colorado, Maine followed suit, ruling Mr. Trump is unable to run in Maine due to the same insurrection clause.

Colorado's Case has already made its way to the Supreme Court, which said it will begin hearing oral arguments on February 8th. This will put the Supreme Court right in the middle of the 2024 election, giving it the chance to influence an election in a way the country has not seen since Bush v. Gore in the presidential election of 2000.

In the case that the Supreme Court rules in favor of Colorado, Mr. Trump may be banned from the election process entirely. This is because the insurrection clause is a general rule, so validating Colorado's ruling would set the precedent for the whole country.

By the time a ruling is made, it is likely that both Mr. DeSantis and Ms. Haley will have suspended their campaigns, putting the primary race in a confusing situation. In that case, there could be some primaries held again in the summer to uphold the democratic process. As for the candidates, while Mr. DeSantis had a strong showing in Iowa, Ms. Haley leads him in several polls elsewhere.

If the Supreme Court overrules Colorado's decision, then the election process would most likely continue as normal with Mr. Trump continuing his campaign.

It is important to note that conservatives constitute a 6-to-3 majority in the current Supreme Court, which could produce a favorable outcome for the former President. Mr. Trump also appointed three justices, but there still exists a chance the Court will rule against him.

Shohei Ohtani, the two-way superstar from Japan (he both pitches and serves as a designated batter), inked a massive contract with the Los Angeles Dodgers that has sent shockwaves through the sporting world. This unprecedented deal secures Ohtani's future with the Dodgers for the next 10 years and allows him to compete for a World Series right now. His deal is for 700 million dollars over 10 years, the largest contract in American professional sports history by a long shot. It is well deserved because of his fantastic play both on the mound and at the plate.

The Dodgers are committed to winning as many World Series Rings as possible, and they think acquiring the two-time American League MVP will help them accomplish this goal. Ohtani is truly one-of-a-kind. He has revolutionized baseball by being the greatest two-way player the game has ever seen. The Dodgers are paying for both one of the best pitchers and hitters, all in one player.

Ohtani doesn't have to move very far to play for the Dodgers. His former team, the Angels, also play in Los Angeles. He had an MLB record 17 sponsorship deals in 2022, and that number will only increase while playing for a far more popular Dodgers team.

As a Japanese player making waves in Major League Baseball, Ohtani's contract carries cultural significance. It not only reflects his success but also highlights the growing global impact of the sport. The deal may inspire a new generation of players worldwide to dream big and strive for excellence. Baseball is hugely popular in Japan, and Ohtani's fame there is enormous. Japan won the 2023 World Baseball Classic with Ohtani's help.

The impact of Ohtani's contract is not all positive. His contract highlights the need for a salary cap in baseball. Right now, owners are allowed to spend as much money as they want to improve their team. THE PRIMARY SEASON'S START

In the past month, the first primary election and caucus were held in New Hampshire and Iowa, respectively, for political parties to decide their nominee for the upcoming presidential election. While these initial electoral processes might not have the most potential for upsets this year, they often reveal the flaws in campaigns and rule out candidates with poor showings.

For the Democratic Party with incumbent President Joe Biden at the helm, there is little competition with only Minnesota Representative Dean Phillips standing in the president's way. He is telling voters that Biden is too old to be an effective leader, which most people, regardless of party, agree with. Still, the president is dominating the polls and comfortably won the first primary.

The nation watched the New Hampshire primaries and the Iowa caucus closely, giving these all-too-often overlooked states considerable attention. The reason the states are first is relatively random, but over the last 50 years it has become something of a tradition.

Now, turning to the Republican Party, this election cycle has become especially interesting for a multitude of reasons, many of which having to do with former President Donald Trump's campaign. Despite a cult-like following, he has faced nagging competition from former South Carolina governor and U.N. ambassador Nikki Haley, his last competitor for the Republican Party's presidential nomination. He also faces 91 criminal charges and a looming Supreme Court case that will decide his eligibility for this election (the question centers on whether former President Trump committed what a post-Civil War amendment calls an "in-

surrection" against the U.S. government for his role in the January 6th riot at the Capitol).

In just about every state, Mr. Trump is seen to be the landslide favorite: even in South Carolina, Haley's home state, he holds a 30 percentage point advantage in early polls. He won 98 out of the 99 counties in the Iowa caucuses and 51% of the votes, over 30% more than his nearest competitor, Florida governor Ron DeSantis, who dropped out of the race before the recent New Hampshire primary.

New Hampshire, however, is no stranger to upset victories – which explains why Haley hoped to capitalize there and carry over the momentum to her home state, which holds primaries on February 24. A primarily rural state that allows independents to vote in either Party's primary, New Hampshire has seen candidates succeed when they campaign at ground level, talking to the people and showing humanity and vulnerability. Indeed, in the 2000 New Hampshire primaries, Senator John McCain staged an upset win over the eventual president, George W. Bush.

Ms. Haley, though, could not muster the required numbers. Instead, she stuck to a "tightly controlled campaign that limited her exposure, [she] played it safe and never gave voters a reason to throw her a life vest," as Jonathan Weisman of the New York Times put it. She was also criticized for struggling to give a consistent and clear argument for why to vote for her and proved unable to persuade enough independents as much as successful underdog candidates have in the past.

As the Times saw the struggle: "Ms. Haley tried out electability — she, not Mr. Trump, would beat Mr. Biden. She tried to praise Mr. Trump while saying it was time for a new generation of leadership. Finally, she tried to convince voters that he was an aged agent of chaos, mentally unfit for another term."

In the end, she lost the vote there by over 10 percentage points to Trump, but it was still a stronger showing than many expected. Thus, she vowed to stay in the election, telling voters that "this race is far from over." Her campaign has amassed over \$1 million in funding since delivering that message.

While it seems that the Nikki Haley campaign's days may not last much longer, if she can learn from her mistakes, pull off an upset win in South Carolina and have a good showing in Nevada, the next state to hold primaries, she will have solid ground to stay in the race. Otherwise, Republican strategists think that she may hang around until Super Tuesday, a day when many states hold their primary elections, and then drop out in the face of overwhelming odds against her.

Another reason she could be staying in stems from the off chance Trump is actually convicted of inciting an insurrection, prohibiting him from running for president under the 14th Amendment. This would throw the Republican nomination wide open, and then primary elections may have to be held again to ensure a fair, democratic process. Extra campaign time would help Haley in this unlikely case. Still, Haley plans to put her best foot forward and fight the uphill battle against Trump. As she said in a fired-up speech after her New Hampshire loss, "I'm a fighter and I'm scrappy," so don't expect her to give up too easily.

The Scroller



A colloquialism of the word delusional. Typically used to mock someone who has unrealistic expectations, especially in regards to romantic relationships.

"You're delulu if you think you're getting an A+ in AP Chemistry"

W or L

Noun

An abbreviation for win and loss, respectively.

Ex: "I got an 100 on the last math test" "W"

"I failed my last math test" "L"

Rizz

Noun

Shortened version of charisma, meaning to have charm or good looks, or to charm someone else.

Ex:

"I asked her out but she rejected me" "L rizz"

Yap Verb

To talk too much.

Ex:

"You could write a book with all that yapping."

Whether you decide to use these slang terms or not is up to you, but at least now you can understand either your students, if you are a teacher, or your peers, if you are a student. I hope this also serves as a reminder to you to stay up to date on trends. Also, please pay attention to when they aren't trendy any longer. Using outdated slang is sometimes embarrassing, so trying to avoid it is groovy.

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No one at Edgemont is a stranger to the high prices of cafeteria food. Many would also argue that these prices do not make sense and are not in line with the quality of the meals. A recent survey revealed that nearly 50% of lunch-purchasing students said they paid \$5 to \$10 for school lunches, while some claimed they spent as much as \$10 to \$15 dollars. So how much should school lunch cost? And are students at Edgemont overpaying?

To start, we have to evaluate the price of school lunch as a whole. Lunch is typically set at \$4.25 a meal.. Occasionally, specials are offered for \$6.75. A cup of fruit also costs as much as a meal (\$4.25), which is steep for anyone who is attempting to eat healthier or add nutrition to a meal they feel is lacking. One student reported seeing a cup of watermelon selling for \$6.00 – more than a full lunch.

Additionally, sandwiches and cartons of food sold in the cafeteria by the gym can cost nearly \$7.00, and a 20 ounce bottle of water costs \$3.00. As one survey response said, "One carton of food should not cost \$6.50," and many seem to agree. The survey concluded that most students believe that a lunch including a full meal and a drink should cost a maximum of \$5.00. If \$3.00 were to be spent on a bottle of water, a fulfilling lunch cannot be supplied with the \$2.00 left in that budget. Besides, many of the lunch options are already over the targeted \$5.00 limit.

Another survey response agreed: "If I'm spending \$6.75 on a meal, I should be able to get at least fries and a drink, or a drink and a muffin." In my opinion, this makes perfect sense – cafeteria servings are best supplemented by another snack or side. Many students also participate in sports after school and need the extra energy or even just the calories to make it through the day.

Another major concern to the students is the recent increase in prices, which prompted one student to say, "it lacks health value, everything is still so expensive, and the price keeps increasing – they don't even display the prices anymore." Indeed, prices at the cafeteria do seem hidden from plain sight.

It also seems that students are not made aware of price increases. For example, students complained about newer foods being raised to "insane prices" like General Tso's chicken with rice: an anonymous student claimed it "used to be \$4.25. Now it's treated as a special and costs \$6.75."

Another student was fired up, saying they were frustrated by raising "THE NEW SANDWICH PRICING WITH-OUT TELLING US." This is a concern as students are now paying more than they are expecting to, oftentimes along with other cafeteria items, such as a snack or a drink.

With such a widespread agreement that food is overpriced, a logical next step would be to reassess the prices. However, we need to think about the feasibility of such price changes.

I think there are a few ways to solve this problem. While the cafeteria could lower their prices, one must account for the many costs that go into preparing school lunch on such a scale. We need to consider the cost of buying often expensive produce, along with labor costs. Inflation also, of course, drives up price. Thus, a decrease in the amount charged could mean a decrease in quality, and according to many students, the food is already "mediocre at best."

Another option would be to keep the prices, but increase the quality of the food. While this would certainly make the high pricing more understandable, it would also mean the cafeteria would have to spend more, which may also not be practical. While both solutions are far from perfect, they are something to think about going forward.





EDGEMONT WRAPPED

What Did Edgemont Listen To In 2023?

With the end of the year comes many things: celebration, joy, and even relief. But the one thing that tops the list is the release of Spotify Wrapped (or Apple Music Replay). People either show their Wrapped to their friends with pride and the realization that 1,000,000 minutes of music is very unhealthy, or they sit in the corner crying about how their most listened to artist somehow became their least favorite. Edgemont is a very diverse community in many ways, music being one of them. Let's see what we listened to last year.

There were two figureheads in Edgemont music last year, and both are among the world's biggest. They are Taylor Swift, the #2 artist in the world, and Drake at #5 in the world. Swift released two albums in 2023, Speak Now (Taylor's Version) and 1989 (Taylor's Version), both of which were re-recorded versions of her popular albums Speak Now and 1989. Her song "Cruel Summer" was one of the most popular songs of the year, peaking at #1 on the Billboard Hot 100 and playing on everyone's For You page.

However, in Edgemont, Taylor played second fiddle to Drake in polls, the most popular musical artist with an amazing 17% of Edgemont poll respondents picking him as their most listened to artist, myself included. Drake has always been very popular here, but his surge in popularity this year might be due to his new 23-track album For All the Dogs that came out in early October. With #1 songs in "Slime You Out" and "First Person Shooter," featuring SZA and J. Cole respectively, as well as other hits such as "Virginia Beach" and "8AM in Charlotte," Drake once again made his case for the title of leading mainstream rap artist. Some of the other most popular artists in Edgemont in 2023 were SZA, Travis Scott, Mitski, Kanye West, Harry Styles, Lana Del Rey, and Yeat.

Rap and pop, the two biggest genres of music, tied with over half of Edgemont having listened to one of the two more than any other genre. Pop music had a great year with albums like GUTS by Olivia Rodrigo, Did You Know That There's a Tunnel Under Ocean Blvd by Lana Del Rey, and Taylor Swift's two albums. Songs like "Flowers" by Miley Cyrus and "Kill Bill" by SZA topped the charts and became sensations in pop culture. And of course we can't forget Barbie, the biggest film of the year grossing \$1.4 billion. Barbie came with its own soundtrack, Barbie: The Album, which featured top artists Lizzo, Dua Lipa, Ice Spice, Nicki Minaj, Sam Smith, and Billie Eilish.

Meanwhile, rap albums from 2023 included For All the Dogs by Drake, UTOPIA, by Travis Scott, SCARING THE H*ES, by JPEGMAFIA and Danny Brown, Pink Tape, by Lil Uzi Vert, Nostalgia, by Rod Wave, A Gift & a Curse by Gunna, and A Great Chaos, by Ken Carson. Additionally, the manager of late rapper Pop Smoke announced that no more posthumous music would be released by him, which upset many fans, including Joe Siegal ('24), who stated that he unironically listened to Pop Smoke more than any other artist this year.

The third most popular genre was pov: indie, with many popular albums released this year such as The Record by Boygenius, The Land Is Inhospitable and So Are We by Mitski, and Javelin by Sufjan Stevens. Indie music seems to have some of the most dedicated fans, including JoJo Anchin ('28) who listened to over 100,000 minutes of music in 2023 and was a top 0.1% listener overall.

This year, Edgemont listened to a variety of music genres, from pop to rap to rock to modern Bollywood. There was a very wide range of top artists, ranging from the Drakes and Taylor Swifts of the world to Radiohead and David Bowie. The Golden Globe Awards honor the best films of the year. From Best Actress to Best Original Song, this ceremony has several awards that can be won by eager screenwriters and actors. Originally founded in 1944, the Golden Globes has become a fun event for viewers and participants alike. The Golden Globes used to be run by the Hollywood Foreign Correspondents Association, but this year has been switched over to CBS. This year, the 81st Golden Globe Award ceremony was full of moments. After a couple of mishaps that led the ceremony to be rescheduled and even canceled in previous years (due to Covid), CBS brought it back to its original slot, Sunday night.

This was the first important televised award ceremony since the writer's strike concluded. 

"What Was I Made For" by Billie Eilish won Best Original Song. It is a sad song with deep messages and was played in the *Barbie* movie. *The Bear*, a show illustrating the struggles of owning a restaurant, won Best Television Series Musical/Comedy.

The popular summer rivalry of

"Barbenheimer" was sparked again in the Golden Globes. With eight nominations, Oppenheimer won five Golden Globes, including Best Director, Best Drama and Best Score. Barbie also had its wins during the ceremony. Every year, many people predict what will happen in the NFL playoffs, but few manage to be 100% correct. It can occasionally be entertaining to read through other people's predictions to see where they think your favorite team will end up. However, it might be even more entertaining to see what people thought was going to happen in retrospect. As of writing this article, it is the morning of Saturday, January 13th, the first day of the NFL playoffs, but you will likely not be reading it until just before the Super Bowl. So sit back, relax, and with your knowledge of what has happened already in the NFL playoffs, take a look at what someone thought the outcome might have been beforehand.

Wild Card Weekend, the first round of the NFL playoffs, can be as unpredictable as it gets, but I will give it my best shot. To start with the favorites, I envision a dominant showing from the Dallas Cowboys, a team with both a top 5 offense and defense in the NFL, who will handily defeat the Green Bay Packers 31-10.

The Pittsburgh Steelers, behind their 3rd string quarterback Mason Rudolph, will be on the wrong end of a lopsided game as well, falling to the high-powered Bills offense in snowy Buffalo 38-7.

Moving to some more closely matched games, I foresee an upset with the Los Angeles Rams defeating the Detroit Lions 28-24. While the Lions have been the better team all year, it is the first playoff game for coach Dan Campbell, who has a tough assignment against a Rams team that still has their Super Bowl-winning core behind coach Sean McVay and quarterback Matthew Stafford – who is playing in a revenge game against his former team.

Back to the AFC, in a low-scoring defensive battle, Joe Flacco and the Cleveland Browns will take down the young and inexperienced Houston Texans on the road 13-6. Down in Tampa Bay, even though the Philadelphia Eagles have struggled late in the season, I cannot imagine a world where Tampa Bay Buccaneers quarterback Baker Mayfield can overcome the Eagles' talented defense: Eagles win 24-13.

Finally, in possibly one of the best games of the first round, I see the Kansas City Chiefs defeating the Miami Dolphins. The Chiefs have looked more vulnerable this year than ever before in the Patrick Mahomes era, but I think they will get their act together for this one, winning 17-10 in the sub-zero temperatures of Kansas City.

Moving on to the Divisional Round, six teams have moved on, while two more enter the fold. The Baltimore Ravens and San Francisco 49ers earned a first-round by for holding the top seeds in their respective conferences, and will now play the lowest remaining seed in their side of the bracket. This means that the Ravens will play the Browns for the third time this season. They split their first two matchups, but I expect the Ravens to win this game somewhat easily behind a stellar performance from this year's MVP favorite Lamar Jackson 23-10. Staying in the AFC, the Bills will match up against the Chiefs once again. Though the Chiefs have won their last two playoff meetings, Kansas City's lack of consistent offense will prove fatal. Bills win 30-13.

In the NFC, the 49ers will easily beat their division rival Rams 35-17 behind a dominant showing from running back Christian McCaffery. In another intra-division matchup, the Cowboys will defeat the Eagles 27-14. The Cowboys have been the superior team all season, and Philadelphia's defensive flaws will be exposed by the deadly combination of Dak Prescott and CeeDee Lamb.

Now, for the Conference Championship games. In the AFC, this leaves the Ravens playing the Bills and in the NFC, the 49ers playing the Cowboys. In a tightly contested game, I think the Bills defense will find a way to shut down Lamar Jackson's dynamic running game. This, combined with the Bills offense mustering a few touchdown drives, should be enough for them to squeak past Baltimore and punch their ticket to the Super Bowl 20-17.

In the NFC, this will be the third year in a row the 49ers and Cowboys have faced off in the playoffs, and for the third year in a row, I expect the 49ers to win. Their running game is too high-powered for the Dallas defense to stop, and their defense could be enough to slow down Dallas' passing game. In a back-and-forth game, San Francisco will win 28-25.

Super Bowl 58 will be held in Las Vegas's Allegiant Stadium on February 11th, 2024. By my predictions, the San Francisco 49ers will face off against the Buffalo Bills, and I am sure it will be an incredibly entertaining game with some even more entertaining commercials. While I think it will be close throughout the first 3 quarters, Buffalo will pull away in the fourth quarter, winning by a final score of 29-14. Josh Allen will cement his legacy as one of the all-time great Bills quarterbacks, delivering the franchise their first-ever Super Bowl win.

Lunar New Year is a holiday celebrated by many and marks the first day of the year in the lunar calendar. The celebration originated 3,500 years ago, during the Han dynasty (202 BC - 220 AD), and usually occurs in late January or early February, in conjunction with the day of the second new moon after the winter solstice.

It all began with a legend, a legend about a monster named Nian 年 who attacked villagers at the beginning of each year. Nian had a long head and sharp horns and showed up to eat crops, livestock, and even people. Most villagers would hide from the ferocious monster, but one wise old man stepped out and refused to hide. He discovered what Nian was afraid of: bright lights, loud sounds, and most of all, the color red. So, the old man lit candles all around the village, burned bamboo (later firecrackers), pasted red paper on doors, and wore red clothes. It was a successful way to scare Nian, and Nian never bothered the villagers again.

Nowadays, a common tradition is to clean your home before Lunar New Year, getting rid of both unwanted things and bad luck from the past year. Usually, people spend the holiday with family and friends. Performances are held featuring the dragon/lion dance 舞龙, also thought to scare away the bad luck and to usher in good fortune. A variety of Chinese music is also played on traditional instruments, including the Pipa 琵琶, Erhu 二胡, Yangqin 扬琴, Guzheng 古筝, and many more.

Food is probably the most important part of the Lunar New Year (at least for me). Different foods represent different ideas. For example, the dumplings 饺子 symbolize comfort, hope, and prosperity. Many family and friends come together to make dumplings, a great bonding activity. Spring rolls 春卷 symbolize bars of gold, and they bring wealth and prosperity for the coming year. Longevity noodles 长寿面 symbolize the wish for a long, health, happy life, and they also make an appearance for birthdays. Because Lunar New Year takes place at the end of winter, fruits like oranges 枯子 thrive. Oranges symbolize prosperity and bring good fortune.

Eight Treasures Rice 八宝饭 symbolizes great fortune, and is a pudding made with painstaking care. Sticky rice balls 汤圆 fittingly symbolize togetherness and reunion.

Each lunar year is named after one of the twelve zodiac animals. The meaning of each originated from Chinese folklore, including the order. Every twelve years the cycle repeats of the rat 鼠, ox 牛, tiger 虎, rabbit 兔, dragon 龙, snake 蛇, horse 马, sheep 羊, monkey 猴, rooster 鸡, dog 狗, and pig 猪. If you are in twelfth grade, you were most likely born in the year of the dog. If you are an eleventh-grader, you were likely born in the year of the pig, while a tenth-grade generally first saw life in the year of the rat.

The zodiac cycle began when the Jade Emperor needed a way to measure time. As the legend goes, he had the animals compete in the race, and planned to name the years after them according to the place they came in the race. The cat and the rat were worried because the race was crossing a river. They asked the ox to carry them over, which he agreed to do. They were pleased that the ox was taking the lead, until the rat pushed the cat off the ox. This is why cats and rats don't get along – and also why the cat is not included in the zodiac cycle. Once the ox neared the bank, the sneaky rat jumped off the back of the ox and landed in first place. Thus, the first year of the cycle is named after the rat, and the ox was tricked into second.

A bit later, the tiger arrived, as the currents were strong. After the tiger came the rabbit, who did not swim but ended up hopping on stones and logs. The dragon took fifth, and the horse almost took sixth, until the snake wriggled up beside him. The horse ended up taking seventh, the snake sixth. The goat, monkey, and rooster built a raft, so the goat became eighth, the monkey ninth, and the rooster tenth. The dog came up next, then the pig. The cat came up later only to discover that he was too late to have a year named after him.

This year, the Lunar New Year falls on Saturday, February 10, 2024. ECC (Edgemont Community Council) and ECA (Edgemont Chinese Association) have co-organized a celebration this year for the Lunar New Year in early February, and it sounds like a fun event in which the entire community can participate.

As a new year starts, so does a new chance for you to improve academically. But how would that be possible if you did the same things you did last year? Here are five tips to enhance your studying this year. Using these tips consistently is likely to lead to stronger academic performance.

Tip 1: Splitting Your Studying Between Multiple Days

Your day starts normally until you realize that your big test is tomorrow and you haven't even looked at your disorganized notes. Instead of ending up in this situation and procrastinating until the last minute, splitting up your studying over three to four days can be beneficial because it can help you grasp the material better and save time. But using this technique is easier said than done. Instead of saying you are going to use this tip but then completely forget about it, aim to allocate at least two days to study, one for going over every part of the material and the other for going over the main ideas and vocabulary of the topic.

Tip 2: Highlighting and Organizing

Upon realizing that you actually have five days until your big test, you sit down at your clean desk and pick up your newly sharpened pencil but then realize that you have no idea how to study because your notes look like a disaster. When writing down notes in class, try to separate them into different sections/topics and highlight the main ideas so when you go to study, everything is much clearer for you, and you can make more connections between sub-topics while you are studying. This does not mean having flawless penmanship is necessary; it just means you need to keep your notes organized.

Tip 3: Pretending to Teach

As you sit confidently reading over your organized notes, you realize that you are probably not using the best technique to understand the topic you are learning. Reading your notes may be a common approach to studying, but it is not necessarily the optimal one. One technique that may work for you is pretending to teach. At first, this may sound weird, but showing what you have learned by saying it out loud can help you acknowledge and further realize any knowledge gaps that need to be filled. This can also help you explain the basic ideas of the topic you are learning and understand the topic on an advanced level.

Tip 4: Blurting

Another technique for actually acknowledging the information you need to learn is blurting. To begin, gather a fresh white sheet of paper, a sharp pencil, a colored pen, and your arranged notes. On this piece of paper, you will write whatever you can remember from the section you need to study. Next, you will look back at your notes and fill in any information that you missed with your colored pen. Then you can review the parts that you have missed and do this again until there are no more gaps in your knowledge, lending you a new-found confidence.

Tip 5: Using Studying Apps

As you wake up on the morning of your big test, your mind is a mix of nerves and confidence in your knowledge. As you make your way to your test, you wonder if there is any way you could further review the material to ensure you have it all covered. This is the ideal moment to pull out your phone and download Quizlet and other study apps. While these apps may not provide a comprehensive understanding of your topic, they can be used for brief five to ten-minute reviews or practice sessions just before your test. With so many study apps available, you will likely want to select one with online flashcards, which can be the fastest review option.

I hope that these five tips help to bolster your academic performance. Keep in mind that everyone has his or her own unique study approach, and it is important to use a technique that suits your personal learning style.



2023 A YEAR IN REVIEW

In 2023, a rollercoaster of events unfolded, bringing both triumphs and challenges. The World Health Organization finally declared the end of the COVID-19 pandemic, the movie Barbie hit the screens, and the FIFA Women's World Cup captivated the world! However, amidst these highs, the Syria-Turkey Earthquake displaced many, and a full-scale war erupted between Israel and Hamas in Palestinian Gaza. Another war currently rages in Sudan, displacing millions amidst changes of ethnic cleansing.

Below are some highlights of 2023:

January: Kevin McCarthy - US House Speaker

In what proved an uproarious events, on January 7th, 2023, after an unprecedented 5-day and 15-round voting process, Republican Leader Kevin McCarthy finally garnered enough vote to become Speaker of the House of US Representatives. This was the longest speaker contest in 164 years. However, in October, the House of Representatives voted to oust him with a narrow 216-210 vote, making him the first-ever US House Speaker to be removed from office.

February: Earthquake in Turkey & Syria

On February 6th, 2023, a devastating 7.8-magnitude earthquake struck southern Turkey and northern Syria, resulting in a death toll of over 50,000 and impacting around 17 million people. In response, various countries and organizations responded, with around 95 nations and 16 international organizations pledging to provide support for the displaced.

March: Taylor Swift's Eras Tour

After the release of her 10th album, *Midnights* (2022), Taylor Swift kicked off The Eras Tour, which began on March 17th, 2023. Her record-shattering tour is set to be the most lucrative concert in the history of the American music industry. With an estimated total of around \$4.1 billion, Swift's earnings would be the most from a single tour to date, exceeding the yearly economic output of 42 countries, as noted by The Washington Post. In addition, she earned the title of *"Forbes"* 5th most powerful woman in the world" and was honored as *Time Magazine's* Person of the Year.

April: Sudan Civil War

On April 15th, 2023, tensions between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) erupted into open conflicts. While fighting has primarily taken place in Sudan's capital, Khartoum, the conflict has created a challenging situation, with implications reaching into the broader geopolitical landscape of Sudan. With over 12,000 casualties and 5.6 million internally displaced since October, it has become the largest internal displacement crisis globally and has contributed to widespread hunger affecting 17.7 million. A U.S. State Department report in December concluded that the RSF had committed ethnic cleansing.

May: COVID-19 Health Emergency

The year saw a decline in the severity of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2023, with the World Health Organization (WHO) ending its global health emergency status on May 11, 2023. The US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) still remain committed to maximizing access to COVID-19 vaccines and treatments. Despite the end of the emergency, the pandemic persists, with well over 100 Americans still losing their lives daily. The transition is viewed as a technical decision, not a sign of the pandemic's resolution.

June: 2023 Canadian Wildfires

In 2023, numerous wildfires swept through Canada, ignited by the combination of summer heat and thunderstorms. Persisting for months in remote locations, these fires emitted thick smoke, triggering widespread air quality alerts and evacuation efforts in both Canada and the United States. On June 7, 2023, smoke from Canadian wildfires covered New York City, affecting air quality.

July: Barbie/Oppenheimer

Two films, *Barbie* and *Oppenheimer*, achieved remarkable box office success upon their releases in July 2023. Presently, *Barbie* is the highest-grossing movie of 2023, taking in \$1.4 billion worldwide, while *Oppenheimer* is the third-highest-grossing movie of the year, taking in \$946 million worldwide.

August: Chandrayaan-3

On August 23, 2023, India marked a historic milestone by successfully landing the Chandrayaan-3 spacecraft on the moon. This achievement positioned India as the fourth nation to successfully accomplish this feat after Russia, China, and the US. India distinguished itself from previous missions by becoming the first nation to successfully land a spacecraft on the moon's unexplored south pole, showcasing a pioneering venture into previously untouched lunar territory.

September: US Open Tennis

On September 9th, 2023, American Coco Gauff won her first major title with a comeback win over Belarus' Aryna Sabalenka. On the men's side of the draw, Novak Djokovic defeated Daniil Medvedev to become the oldest US Open Men's singles champion in the Open Era. By reaching his 47th men's singles major final, Djokovic surpassed Roger Federer's record and equaled Federer's record of reaching all four major finals in a season three times.

October: Israel - Hamas War

On October 7, 2023, Hamas and other militant groups launched a cross-border attack on Israel. The attack killed around 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and took over 200 people captive. In response, Israel initiated an extensive military operation with objectives that included dismantling Hamas, regaining control of the Gaza Strip, and rescuing hostages. This full-scale conflict has resulted in a severe humanitarian crisis with shortages of essential resources such as food, clean water, medicine, and fuel, and has led to a collapse of healthcare services in Gaza.

November: 2023 MLB Season

On November 1, 2023, The Texas Rangers defeated the Arizona Diamondbacks to win the World Series in 5 games at Chase Field in Phoenix, Arizona. This marks their first Major League Baseball championship in their 63-year existence. Corey Seager, a shortstop for the Texas Rangers, was named as the World Series MVP.

December: COP28 United Arab Emirates

The 28th United Nations Climate Change Conference, commonly referred to as COP28, convened in Dubai, UAE. The event is intended for governments to come together with a shared goal of implementing policies to curb global temperature increases and adapt to the impacts of climate change. A deal between all the countries was signed on December 13, 2023; it commits all signatories to move away from all carbon energy sources. If carried out, this deal would help mitigate some of the worst effects of climate change, reach net zero by 2050, and triple renewable energy by 2030.

Despite the numerous challenges that unfolded in 2023, the existed many notable positives. The remarkable progress witnessed across various scientific and artistic fields serves as a beacon of hope and a head start for the extraordinary achievements that may unfold throughout 2024.
